



1.d4 I won three last games against Bartek, so I was in good shape, despite all that games I played with white. **1...Sf6 2.Sf3 e6 3.Lg5 c5 4.c3 b6?!** Now white has a clear advantage. More accurate was [4...h6 5.Lh4 (5.Lxf6 Dxf6 6.e4 cxd4!? 7.cxd4 Lb4+ 8.Sc3 0-0 9.a3 Lxc3+ 10.bxc3 d6= and black's position is quite solid) 5...b6] **5.e4 h6 6.Lxf6 Dxf6 7.Ld3 Lb7 8.0-0 Dd8**



After this move Bartek spent 50 minutes. It was the reason of his time-trouble. 9.Te1 Le7 **10.Lc4!?** Interesting continuation. More solid was: [10.Sbd2 0-0 11.Sf1 d6 12.Sg3 Sd7 13.a3± and white has more space] 10...cxd4! Other moves were even worse [10...0-0 11.d5± with the idea Bf1,c4 and e5; 10...d5 11.exd5 Lxd5 12.Lxd5 Dxd5 13.c4!] 11.cxd4 0-0 12.d5 Dc7 13.Dd3 a6 14.Sc3?! This obvious move leads to the unclear play. [14.Sbd2! b5 15.Lb3 Db6 16.e5± and black has no room to breath:)] 14...e5!∞ 15.Tac1 d6 16.a4 Sd7 17.b4 Dd8 18.Tc2 g6 19.Sd2 Kg7?! | played too slowly, better was [19...Lg5 20.Sb3 f5 21.g3 f4,] **20.Sb3 Lg5 21.a5?!** [21.g3! This strong move was overlooked by both of us. 21...h5 22.h4 Lh6 23.a5÷] 21...f5! [21...b5? 22.Sxb5 (22.Lxb5?? axb5 23.Sxb5 La6-+) 22...axb5 23.Lxb5± And it looks like black has a real problem how to stop white pawns.] 22.axb6 Dxb6 23.Sa5 Dxb4 **24.Tb1?!** Bartek was in time-trouble now. [24.Ta2? With the idea Rb1, but simply it doesn't work. 24...Sc5 25.Dc2 Sxe4-+; 24.Sc6! Db6 25.Sa4 Dc7 26.Lb3!a 24...Dxa5 25.Txb7 Tf7!? 31.g3? This is the result of Bartek's time-trouble. [31.h4!
